Answers to the Medical Quiz

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A1. Bowen's disease.

Definition

Bowen's disease (BD) or squamous cell carcinoma in-situ is a cutaneous malignancy first described by Bowen in 1912¹. It may affect any part of the skin both sun-exposed and non-sun-exposed, mucocutaneous junction and nail bed^{2,3}.

Clinical features

BD is characterized by being asymptomatic, slowly growing erythematous, scaly or crusted lesion, single or multiple, discrete and irregular in shape^{2,3}.

Differential diagnosis

- 1. Paget's disease
- 7. Malignant melanoma
- ^τ. Bowenoid papulosis
- ٤. Seborrheic keratosis

Histology

There is a full thickness dysplasia of the epidermis with mitotic figures at different levels^{3,4}. The histologic variants include psoriasiform, atrophic, verrucous-hyperkeratotic, irregular, pigmented, and pagetoid pattern^{3,4}.

Etiology

The etiology is multifactorial, which includes UV light, human papilloma virus and immunosuppression².

Treatment

- 1. Surgical excision
- Y. Topical 5-flurouracil
- ۳. Topical imiquimod
- ٤. Cryotherapy
- o. Curettage and electrocautery

- ٦. Radiotherapy
- V. Laser ablation (carbon dioxide, argon, neodymium:yttrium-aluminum-garnet)
- A. Photodynamic therapy (PDT)

Prognosis

Three percent to 8% may progress to invasive carcinoma if untreated ⁵. Genital and neck lesions have 10% risk of progressing to invasive carcinoma ⁶. The invasive carcinoma is aggressive and carries 3%-5% risk of metastasis ⁵. Five-year recurrence rate after standard surgical excision is 19% and 6.3% after Mohs micrographic surgery (MMS)^{6,7}.

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
